SINGLE CHOICE

Which state agency is responsible for licensing and regulating alarm company operators in California?

ANSWER A

WHY Alarm company operators in California are licensed and regulated by the Bureau of Security and Investigative Services (BSIS), which operates under the Department of Consumer Affairs. The other agencies listed do not have jurisdiction over alarm company licensing.

To qualify for an alarm company operator license, an applicant must designate a qualifying manager who meets experience requirements. Which statement about the qualifying manager is correct?

ANSWER B

WHY California regulations require a license applicant to designate a qualifying manager with documented experience in alarm-related work, generally at least one year of qualifying experience within the three years preceding the application. The qualifying manager is required regardless of business structure, and there is no firearms permit or private investigator license requirement tied to this specific role.

QUESTION 3

WHY Alarm company employees who perform licensed activities must be registered with the Bureau of Security and Investigative Services, and the registration must be filed within the timeframe prescribed by regulation before the employee performs licensed work. Local police approval, FBI background checks, and website postings are not required by BSIS for alarm company employee registration.

QUESTION 4

A central monitoring station receives a burglary alarm signal from a protected premises. What is the required first action of the monitoring operator?

Immediate dispatch without verification, lengthy waits, and notifying the Bureau first are not the required first actions.

Roof signage with the alarm company's name, 30-day battery replacement, and mandatory guard hiring are not typical ordinance requirements.

Short, single-year retention, mandatory paper-only storage in a safe, and voluntary non-inspectable records are not correct.

Paying above minimum wage, keeping regular business hours, and placing directory advertising are lawful activities and do not constitute grounds for discipline.
