QUESTION 1

SINGLE CHOICE

Under the Pennsylvania anthracite underground mining laws, what is the primary statutory reference that establishes the duties, authority, and responsibilities of mine inspectors?

ANSWER B

WHY Anthracite mining in Pennsylvania is regulated primarily under state law, specifically the Anthracite Mine Law Act of 1905 and the Pennsylvania Mine Safety Act. Federal MSHA standards apply to coal mines generally, but state anthracite inspectors enforce Pennsylvania's anthracite-specific statutes and regulations.

ANSWER B

WHY When an anthracite mine inspector determines that an imminent danger exists, the inspector is authorized under Pennsylvania's anthracite mine safety laws to withdraw miners from the affected area and issue an order stopping the operation until the dangerous condition is corrected.

Which of the following is a characteristic hazard most associated with anthracite underground mining operations in Pennsylvania?

ANSWER C

WHY Anthracite seams in Pennsylvania are characterized by steep pitches and an extensive network of old, often water-filled abandoned workings. Water inundation from these old workings is one of the most distinctive hazards of anthracite underground mining. Methane and coal dust hazards are more closely associated with bituminous mining.

QUESTION 4

SINGLE CHOICE

During an inspection of an anthracite underground mine, the inspector notes that the ventilation plan does not appear to adequately direct air over working faces. What is the inspector's primary concern?

ANSWER B

WHY The primary purpose of mine ventilation is to supply fresh air to working faces, dilute and carry away harmful gases, dust, and contaminants, and to maintain a safe, breathable atmosphere. Failure to direct adequate air to working faces allows buildup of harmful gases and respirable dust and is a serious violation of ventilation requirements.

QUESTION 5

SINGLE CHOICE

Which of the following roof support practices is required in areas of an anthracite underground mine where the roof is broken or suspicious, and where persons are required to travel or work?

ANSWER B

WHY Where roof conditions are broken or suspicious, anthracite mine regulations require positive measures to make the area safe, such as scaling down loose material, installing supplemental supports, barring down loose material, or otherwise controlling the roof before persons are permitted to travel or work in the area.

An inspector is reviewing the map of an anthracite underground mine and notes that boreholes are required to be drilled when approaching a known area of abandoned mine workings that may contain water. What is the primary purpose of these boreholes?

ANSWER C

WHY Boreholes are drilled in advance of mining toward abandoned or worked-out areas that may contain accumulations of water, gas, or other hazards. Their primary purpose is to intercept water or gas before mining breaks into the old workings so that miners can be safely withdrawn and the hazard can be controlled or drained.

Which of the following are recognized as significant hazards specific to anthracite underground mining operations in Pennsylvania? (Choose two.)

ANSWER A - B

WHY Anthracite mining in Pennsylvania is distinguished by the threat of water inundation from extensive, often interconnected abandoned workings and by steeply pitching seams that complicate roof control, haulage, and material handling. Hydrogen sulfide liberation is associated with low-rank coals and bituminous mining, and methane hazards at levels typical of Pittsburgh seam bituminous mines are not a defining characteristic of anthracite operations.

Under Pennsylvania's anthracite mine safety laws, after an inspector issues an order to withdraw persons from a section of an anthracite underground mine, what is the required follow-up action by the operator before mining may resume?

WHY When an anthracite mine inspector issues a withdrawal order or closure order under the anthracite mine safety laws, the operator must take corrective action and demonstrate that the dangerous condition has been abated. Mining may not resume until the inspector, in most circumstances, verifies and approves that the condition has been corrected.

ANSWER C

WHY The mine map required by Pennsylvania anthracite mining laws is a safety document used to show the location and extent of mine workings, dangerous conditions, ventilation controls, and known hazards such as water or gas accumulations. It is not used to record wage information of individual miners.
